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I. GENERAL COURSE INFORMATION:

- A. COURSE DESCRIPTION: ENGL 2332. (3:3:0) This course is a study of selected literary masterpieces written through the Renaissance. Prerequisites: ENGL 1301 & 1302
- B. GOAL OF THE COURSE: English 2332 introduces students to some of the great works of literature, from the Ancient World through the Renaissance, which helped to shape modern literature, language and culture. The course includes a general historical background, as well as the principles of literary criticism appropriate to the literature

II. SPECIFIC COURSE/INSTRUCTOR REQUIREMENTS:

- A. TEXTS: *The Norton Anthology of World Literature* Volume 1 Shorter 4th edition.
Shakespeare, William. *The Tragedy of Macbeth*.
Sir Gawain and the Green Knight
- B. COURSE ATTENDANCE: Students are expected to attend all classes to be successful in this course. Students are responsible for all work missed during an absence. Students may be dropped from this course if, in the instructor's opinion, absences become excessive and minimum course objectives cannot be met.
- C.
