Course Description: This course is the basic study of limits and continuity, differentiation, optimization and graphing, and integration of elementary functions, with emphasis on applications in business, economics, and social sciences. This course is not a substitute for MATH 2313 or 2413, Calculus I.

Prerequisite: Successful completion with a grade of 'C' or better in MATH 1324 or MATH 1314.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course and receiving a passing grade, the student will be able to:

1. Apply calculus to solve business, economics, and social sciences problems.
2. Apply appropriate differentiation techniques to obtain derivatives of various functions, including logarithmic and exponential functions.
3. Solve application problems involving implicit differentiation and related rates.
4. Solve optimization problems with emphasis on business and social sciences applications.
5. Determine appropriate technique(s) of integration.
6. Integrate functions using the method of integration by parts or substitution, as appropriate.
7. Solve business, economics, and social sciences applications problems using integration techniques.

Student Learning Outcomes Assessment: A pre- and post-test questions will be used to determine the extent of improvement that the students have gained during the semester

Course Evaluation: The final grade in the class will be the average of the major exams and the homework. There will be no makeup exams given. A grade of 0 will be assigned for missed exams and the cumulative final will be counted in its place to replace that 0. To maximize the potential to complete this course a student should attend all class meetings, complete all homework assignments and exams.

Homework will be assigned daily. Questions are taken at the next class period only. You are responsible for keeping up to date and prepared. No late homework will be accepted...no exceptions. Keeping up to date and current on the homework has been shown to correlate with passing the course.

Attendance Policy: Attendance and effort are the most important activities for success in this course. Records of your attendance are maintained throughout the semester. Five (5) absences, **for any reason**, are allotted to the student for the semester. Tardies count as one-half (1/2) of an absence. Tardies will be applied for consistently being late to class, as deemed by the instructor and leaving class early. If this number is exceeded, the instructor has the right to drop you with a grade of F or an X, depending on their discretion.

Cell Phones: In this class, the instructor reserves the right to ask a student to leave the class if the phone is left on and it disrupts the class. This instructor defines disrupting the class as texting, being on social media, allowing the phone to ring or vibrate in class or answering the phone. This is very disrespectful to other students around you and to the instructor. During exams having a cellphone visible or having a cellphone disrupting a class will penalize a student by at least 20 points.
